

October Meeting: Meet The New University President Dr. Taylor R. Randall



Taylor R. Randall, Ph.D. was selected as the 17th president of the University of Utah by the Utah Board of Higher Education on August 5, 2021. Prior to his appointment as president, Dr. Randall led the nationally ranked David Eccles School of Business for 12 years. Under his innovative and dynamic leadership as dean, the Eccles School grew five-fold, creating significantly greater opportunity for students, faculty, and the community. Before

assuming the role of dean, Dr. Randall served as a professor of accounting for 11 years, earning accolades throughout his teaching career for his relentless focus on students. He graduated from the University of Utah with honors in accounting and then earned an MBA and Ph.D. in operations and information management from the Wharton School of Business at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Randall is a third-generation professor with a long and deep commitment to the University of Utah.

From the Hiking Group




Big Cottonwood Canyon from the Guardsman Pass Road

AROHE, CLUB HISTORY AND THE YEAR AHEAD

September—one of the busiest months of the academic year at the U. Classes have started and projects and events are well underway across campus.

Your Emeriti Club Board has been active, too. We already have a full schedule of presentations lined up for our monthly programs (posted elsewhere in this newsletter). Despite concerns and restrictions related to the recent surge of COVID cases, we've also begun to inform and assist Club members interested in taking advantage of theatre, symphony and other arts and cultural offerings in the community. And as soon as the risks of the pandemic abate, and travel is safer, we hope tours will once again be possible.

We've also been exploring other ways Club members can become involved. Our new membership in the Association of Retirement Organizations in Higher Education (AROHE) has been very helpful in that research, as has the history of the U's Professors Emeriti Club, a book which chronicles the evolution of our organization from 1965 to 1999.

AROHE is a valuable source of information and ideas about ways to engage a larger number of our Club members than we do now. Be assured, our monthly luncheons will continue to be an important way for members to gather, socialize, and enjoy outstanding speakers and presentations. But surveys of our members and records of attendance at the luncheons suggest that a sizable number of emeriti do not attend the luncheons or other activities of the Club. That's where AROHE has been helpful. There's no one model followed by all AROHE institutions, but many of them enlarge the scope of member involvement through interest groups meeting on an ongoing basis, or occasional workshops with a specific focus.

At other AROHE institutions, interest groups are circles of individuals who meet at a time and place of their own choosing to explore an issue or share an activity. We already have one such entity —the hiking group— which posts notices of its hikes and encourages others to become involved through announcements in the Club newsletter. It can be a model for other interest groups we establish. These might include a book club, a writing group or a travel club. Following AROHE examples, they might also focus on financial planning and investments, preparing for retirement, or on health, wellness and aging. Committees are also a means employed by some AROHE universities to plan and coordinate activities. (The history of our own Club reveals that committees once played a similar role in our organization.)

Other possibilities worth considering (and offered by our Club in the past): a dinner and/or reception welcoming new emeriti, occasional university updates from officers in the administration, and stronger connections with the Faculty Club.

All of these could provide opportunities for involvement beyond the programs and activities we currently offer.

What else does AROHE offer us? It's a resource for individual members of our Club. We'll share items that we think might be of broad interest (such as this article about "Advancing Age Inclusivity in Higher Education": https://www.geron.org/programs-services/education-center/age-friendly-university-afu-global-network) as well as links to discussions on selected topics open to everyone. But if you'd like direct access to the AROHE site and its full array of offerings, let Don Strassberg know and he'll add your contact information to our AROHE membership "bundle."
